What is Leadership and Why is it Important?

Leadership is about using your knowledge, skills, personality, and experience to positively influence early childhood best practice.

Every educator has the capacity to lead, and by doing so to improve opportunities for children and their families. Educators can promote developmentally appropriate ways of working with children which in turn supports professional growth and development.

Early childhood educators can enact leadership by presenting the values and supporting the goals of the classroom.

Leadership may be taking overall responsibility for a whole setting or several settings, putting in place policies and procedures to enable the setting to achieve its aims, and providing a structure for the workforce to work with. This is how many people view leadership, but leadership is much more than this. It might be looking for ways to do your own job more effectively.

Leaders:


- Make children's learning, development and well being the primary focus.
- Address children's rights and honor diversity of all kinds in positive, constructive, and courageous ways.
- Build respectful, trusting, nurturing and equitable relationships.
- Build respectful and genuine relationships with families and communities.
- Collaboratively develop a culture of ethical inquiry.
- Collaboratively create a community of learners.

- Promoting professional development & improving the profession
- Participating in decision making processes about early childhood

Standard I, Elements D & E: Leaders are ethical and advocate for children by:

- Collaborating with families & providing resources to support children
- Being involved in IEP teams and advocating for change in early education policies
