The 4 C's of 21st Century Skills are Collaboration, Critical thinking, Creativity and Communication. In preschool children begin to acquire the skills listed below, designing a classroom with this knowledge creates an inspiring learning environment where children can flourish.

21st Century Skills can be grouped in three categories:

- Learning Skills: Critical Thinking, Creative Thinking, Collaboration, and Communication
- Literacy Skills: Information Literacy, Media Literacy, and Technology Literacy
- Life Skills: Flexibility, Initiative, Social Skills, Productivity, and Leadership

Strategies for Implementing 21st Century Skills in the Classroom

- Integrate age-appropriate technology with educational content, use media sources to explore children's interests and extend learning
- Provide opportunities for children to make choices and move freely in the classroom
- Support global citizenship by selecting materials and activities that reflect all cultures and families within the community
- Introduce and utilize varied types of literacy
- Intentionally create opportunities for children to develop social skills and collaboration
- Celebrate and encourage children's creative thinking and problem-solving
- Model flexibility by allowing adaptations to the lesson plan and daily schedule
- Encourage various forms of written and verbal communication

Are the classroom displays a reflection of children's creative thinking and productivity?

How am I intentionally embedding opportunities for children to collaborate and communicate with their peers?

Am I empowering the children in the classroom through opportunities for leadership?

- Children are active learners and they learn through play (GP #8)


